
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

Celebrating Black History Month: A Profile of New Jersey's Black and African American Residents¹

Celebrating the diversity of our state's residents, the New Jersey Department of Labor and Workforce Development (NJDOL) releases periodic Labor Market Spotlights that showcase population groups and the important contributions they make to the state's economy. In the spirit of Black History Month, we are releasing the second annual Labor Market Spotlight to showcase Black and African American members of our community. Black residents make up about 12.6% of New Jersey's population. A significant portion are foreign-born. NJDOL has been working to close equity gaps, serving nearly 43,000 Black residents at its One-Stop Career centers in 2023.

which refers to the individuals we are highlighting as 'Black or African American.'


For brevity, however, in the rest of this spotlight, we refer to this group as 'Black.'




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Educational Attainment New Jersey Population 25 and Older

The largest occupational group for Black residents is management, business, science and arts, which includes jobs like financial managers, chemists, and computer


